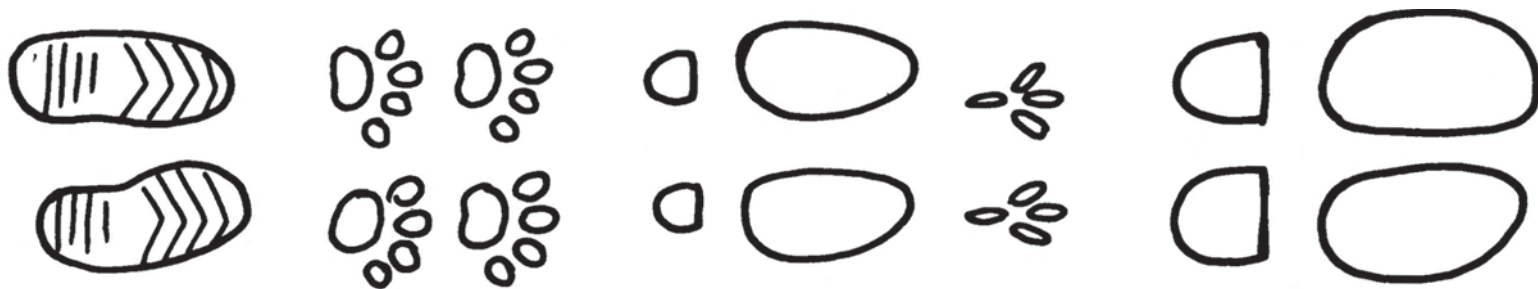


Pedestrians

We are all pedestrians when we walk.

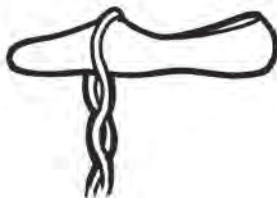




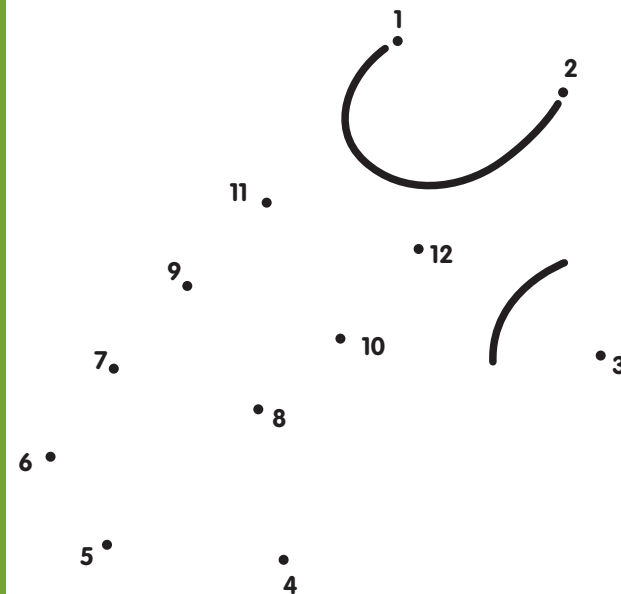

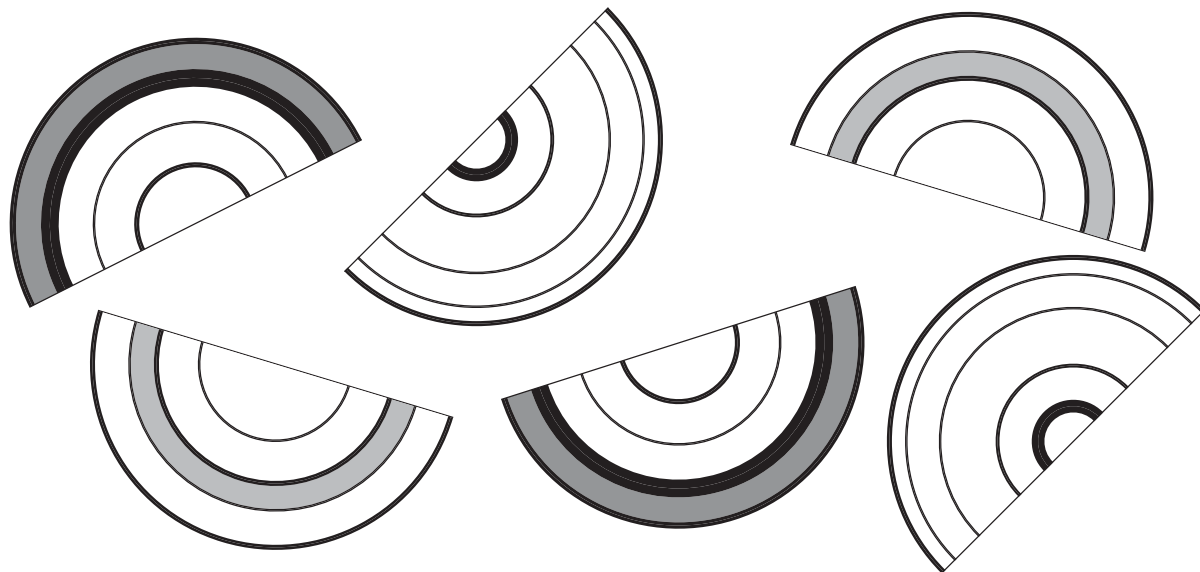
Wheels on pavements

Circles

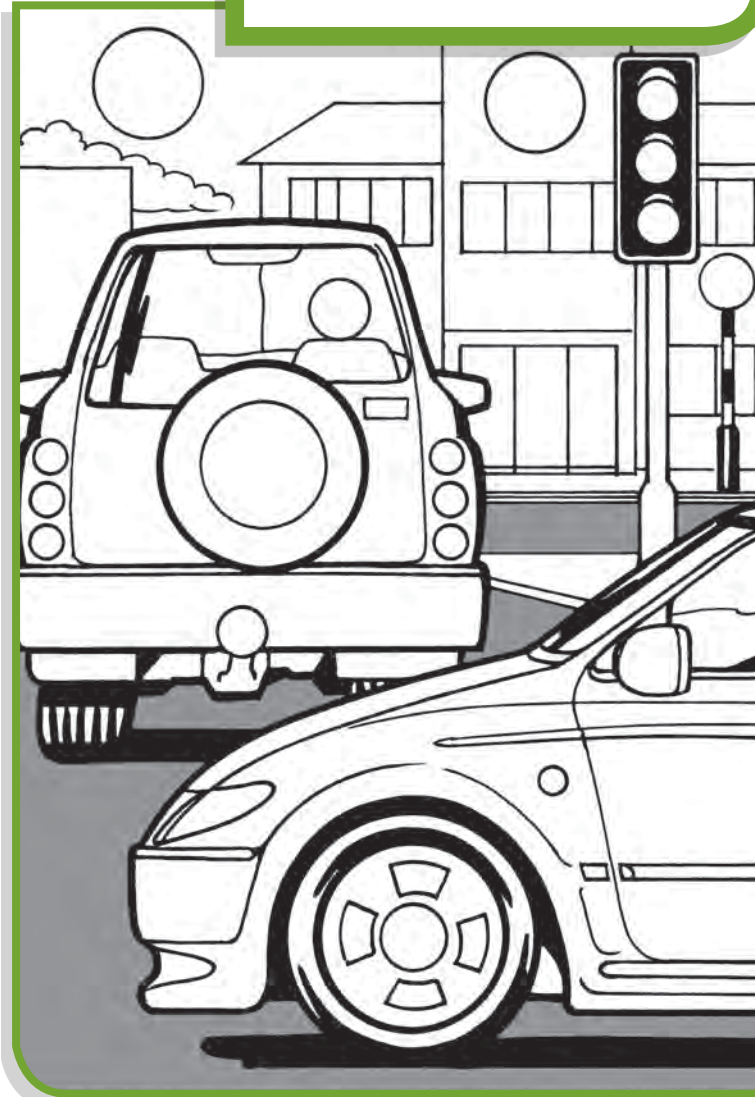
Wheels are round. This whole round shape is called a circle. If we take a half a circle it is called semi-circle.



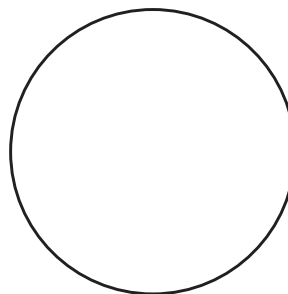
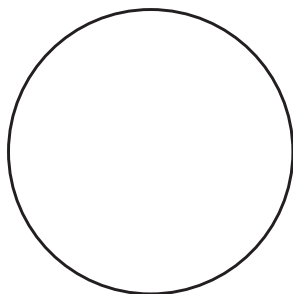
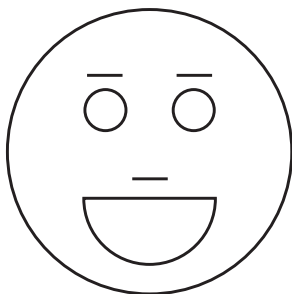

Walk as close to the edge of the road as possible.



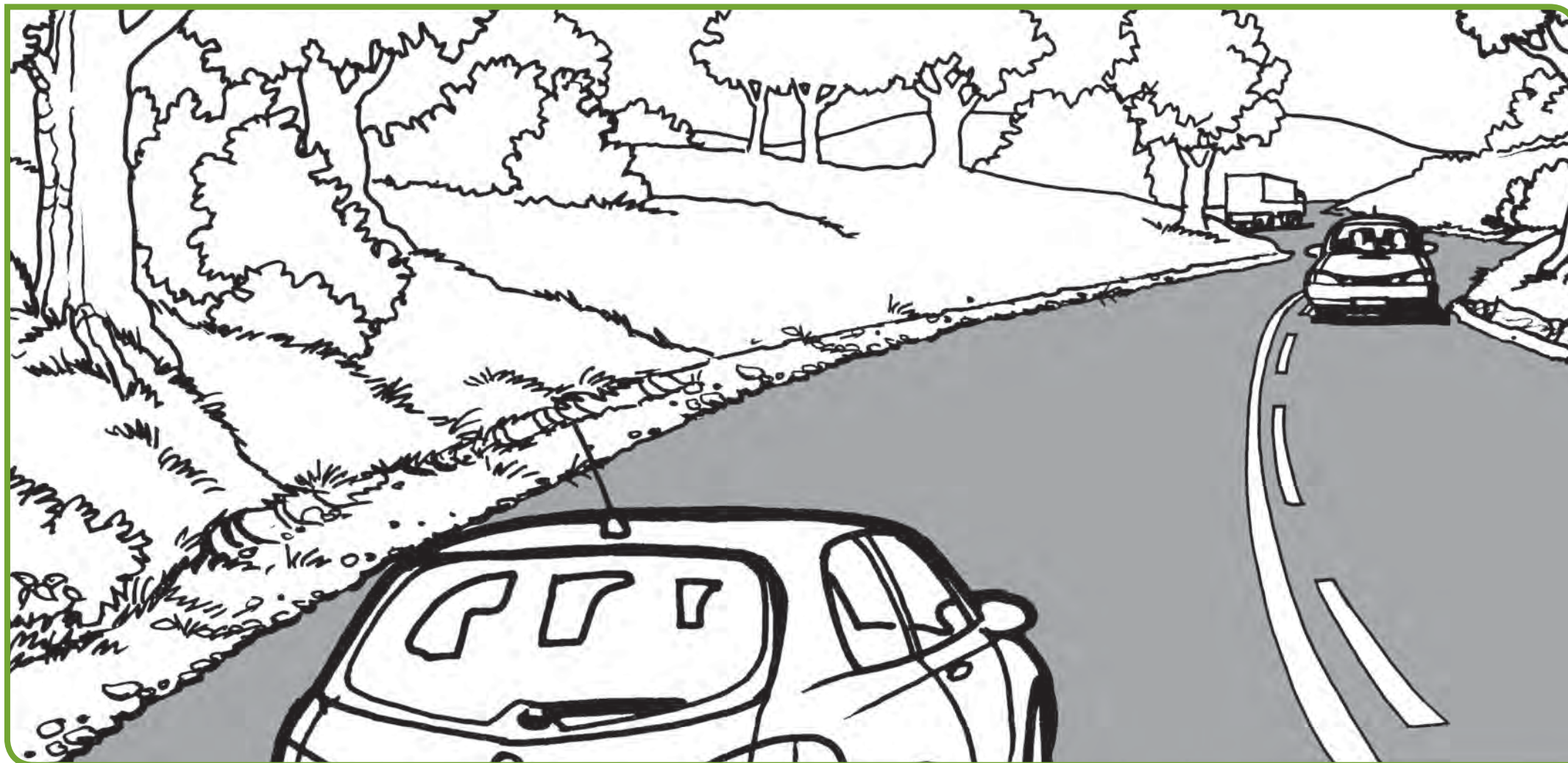
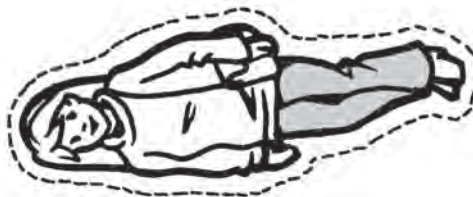
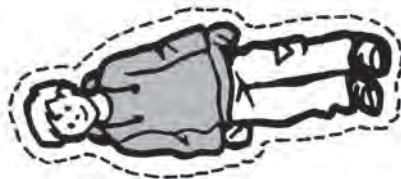
Walk behind each other, especially at bends.

Cut around the figures and stick them on the large picture below. Remember, they must walk facing traffic coming towards them.



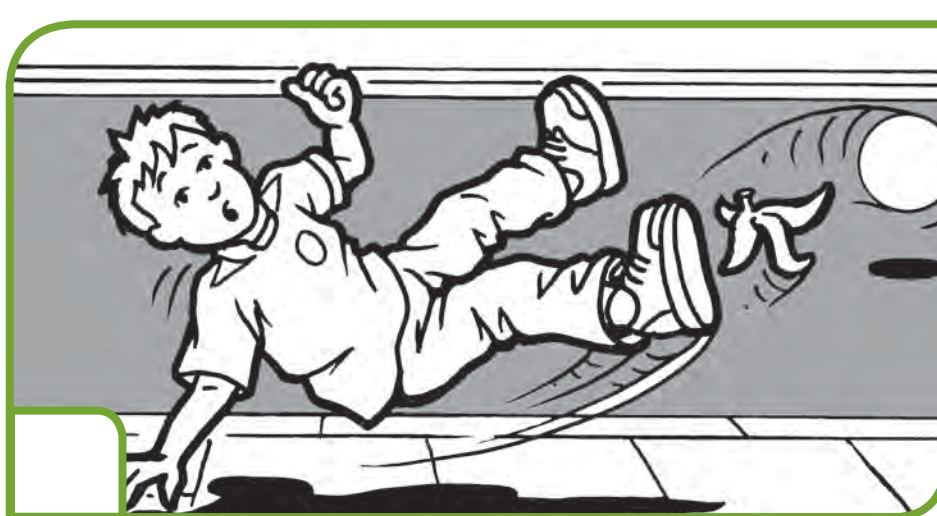
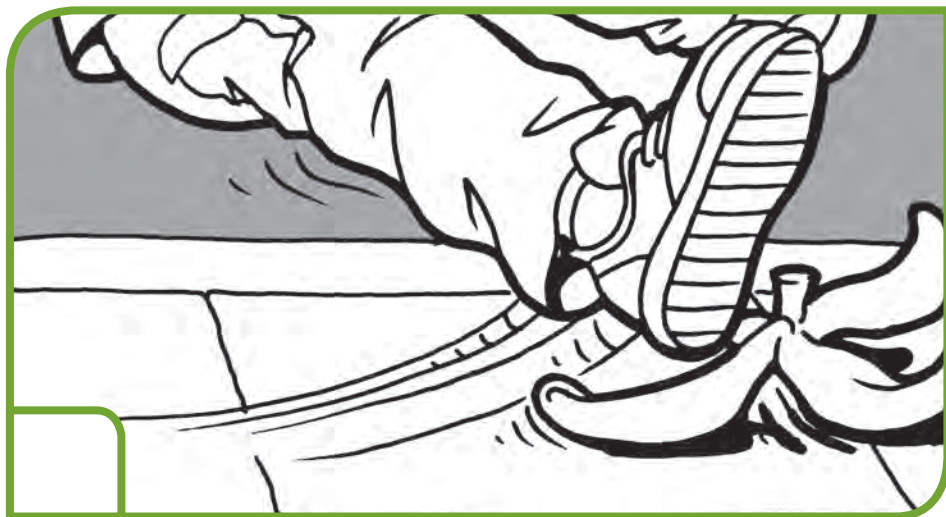


Walk, don't run

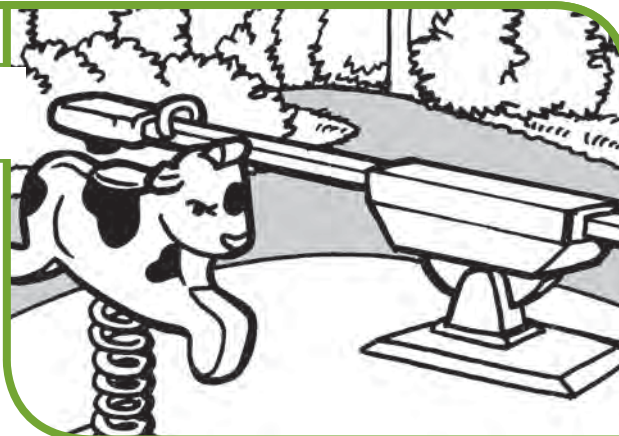




Play in safer places

It is very important that drivers can see us when we are out, so that they can be extra careful. Bright and colourful clothes help us to be seen during daytime.



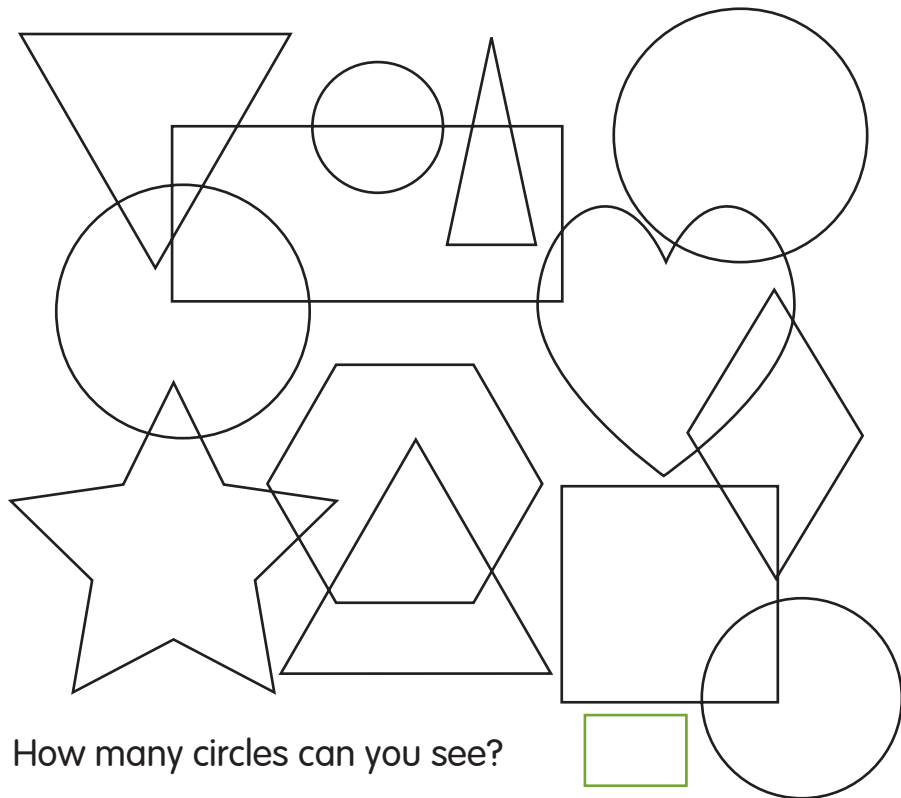
Colour this **daytime** picture so that the pedestrians can be seen easily by the driver. Use bright colours.
