

Can you match the footprints to the feet in the picture? Draw a line to join the footprints to the correct feet.



















Pavements are for pedestrians to walk on safely away from the road.




The pictures show things that go on the pavement. Find the odd one out and draw a circle around it.






Traffic and vehicles

Everything that travels on the road is called traffic. Traffic is made up of many kinds of vehicles.











Wheels on pavements

Circles


Wheels are round. This whole round shape is called a circle. If we take a half a circle it is called semi-circle.







Can you see a face in the circle below? Make more faces in the other two circles, only using circles, semi circles or lines.














No Pavement

Walk facing the traffic that is coming towards you.




Walk as close to the edge of the road as possible.




Walk behind each other, especially at bends.




Cut around the figures and stick them on the large picture below. Remember, they must walk facing traffic coming towards them.



Walk, don't run


Running is good fun, but only if you are in a safer place away from traffic. Never run when you are out near a road, as you may fall down and put yourself in danger.






Play in safer places
